Behind the Khojand hills of Tadjikistan stands State Prison 3/13 UIP RT. A women's prison, more than half of whose inmates are entirely innocent. They have assumed the guilt for crimes committed by their husbands or sons and have been sentenced in their place. Kholbi (42) decided to stand in for her fifteen year-old son. The boy had hoped to travel to Moscow and earn money on the proceeds of a few stolen cows. In a bid to protect his future, Kholbi pleaded guilty to her child's offence. She received a three-year sentence. The women's prison in Khojand, its staff and inmates, are typical of the situation prevailing in Tadjikistan. This is a country which has long been wracked by civil war and has become a haven for dubious practises. A country where wealth determines the course of justice.

The film attempts to see inside the conflict ravaging the Balkans, and strives for fresh insight into similar hotspots like Chechnya, Sudan, and the inner cities of America. The film also chronicles the transformation of a cameraman from video soldier-of-fortune into producer-with-a-mission: to help convert the dog-eared recipe for war into a workable formula for peace.
